# LIBRARY RESOURCES


The Korean Collection at the C.V. Starr East Asian Library consists of 159,000 volumes, 338 current subscribed serials, and over 3,780 non-book formats including microfilms, audiovisual materials, and cartographic materials. Materials published in North Korea are also being collected continuously.

CKR also serves as a bridge between Korean Studies in North America and the most recent work of the Korean academic world through its sponsorship of visiting scholars and active partnerships with universities and institutions in South Korea.

The Center for Korean Research also sponsors the annual "Center for Korean Research Manhae Prize for Korean Language" in the Department of East Asian Languages and Cultures.

The CKR at Columbia University has continued to expand with the on-going support of the Myoung-Soo Shin Fund, the Academy of Korean Studies, the Korea Foundation, and the Columbia Alumni Association of Korea (CAA Korea).

# **KOREAN STUDIES AT COLUMBIA**

The Department of East Asian Languages and Cultures (EALAC) offers Korean Language instruction up to the fifth-year level annually, and additional courses on literature, civilization, and history. Korea-related courses are taught regularly in the departments of history, political science, anthropology, and economics, and in the law and business schools. Columbia also houses the only Center for Korean Legal Studies in the United States. Columbia has been committed to the expansion and improvement of Korean Studies in the United States for nearly forty years, and it will continue to be intellectually and financially supportive of Korean Studies as an integral part of its research and curriculum into the future.
